In the evenings, Marin sits behind the glass window of the ticket office, drawing and letting her mind wander. She is on her way out into life following her graduation, uncertain of what awaits her and what she wants for herself. Her search for a room to rent leads her from house to house, from one woman to another. They all have stories and dreams, but around them hover men with their own ideas. *Street of the Mothers* takes place in the 1960s, and the roles of the sexes are clear. On this street the women are in charge; it is their world, with children and laundry, staring and gabbing – but also secrets and unsaid words, love and lovelessness.



Harpa Eir flees the city to save her daughter from the questionable company she is keeping. With mother and daughter in tow, it is Harpa's friend who drives the car, the heading set for the family estate in the east. But the journey soon turns into more than saving her child, because unknown to her, Harpa Eir is on her way to a meeting with the truth about herself.

Place of the Heart is a powerful travel story where the road leads not only past the majestic nature along the roadside, but also the barren landscape of the mind. Inside the car and out, the trio face various challenges while all around them swarm haunting memories and characters from the past, both alive and dead. 400 pp

Steinunn Sigurdardottir (b.1950) is one of Iceland's most highly acclaimed novelists and poets and has sustained a writing career since 1969, as well as a distinguished career in journalism. Her first novel, *The Thief of Time* was made into a French feature film and later adapted to the stage by The National Theatre of Iceland. Blóðberg, historical novel, 2020

Thordis Halldorsdottir was sentenced to die at Parliament in Thingvellir in 1618. Her supposed crime was to have had a baby with her brother-in-law, Tomas Bodvarsson. This was considered incest and punishable by death, according to the laws in Iceland at the time. However, this was never proven.

Bloodstone is a novel based on the story of the young girl from the North, the first woman in Iceland to be drowned at Parliament. She swore an oath that she was still a maiden, but gave birth to a child five months later, and argued her case at Parliament for ten years before a verdict was issued.

Undir Yggdrasil, historical fiction, 2020

The year is 900, the place, Iceland, newly settled by Nordic Vikings.

Thorgerd Thorsteinsdottir gave birth to twins barely a grown-up herself, but she had to wait a long time to have the child she had most yearned for, Thorkatla. All the more tragic are the events following the Assembly, when the little girl is seven years old – events no one can understand. Thorgerd chooses to seek support from the Norns who decide the fates of men under Yggdrasil, the Tree of Life, rather than from the White Christ of her grandmother, and the quest for truth leads her to setting sail from Iceland, east across the ocean, and eventually, on a seeress's journey into the Underworld and the Realms of the Dead.

Under Yggdrasil is a gripping novel inspired by the Icelandic Sagas, as was Vilborg Davidsdottir's acclaimed trilogy of novels on Aud the Deep-Minded, the first of which was nominated for the Icelandic Prize for Literature. Davidsdottir's historical novels have been tremendously popular over the last decades, especially as they throw a new and unexpected light on the lives of women in the Viking Age. 329 pp

On New Year's Eve, Edda is invited to a wedding at Thingvellir National Park for people she hardly knows. She asks her neighbor Finn to come along while her granddaughter, Dagny Edda, photographs the ceremony with her friend. They all become entangled in an investigation into a terrifying crime committed outside the little church. The investigation shines an unexpected spotlight onto the party organized by the Prime Minister at the old Thingvellir farmhouse and upsets the young girls' mysterious New Year's Plans.

The Faceless Woman is Leosdottir's fifth book about Edda, her struggles with complex criminal cases, and relations with her family, which are sometimes no less complex. 329 pp

From the 17th to the 20th Century, scientists made numerous breakthrough discoveries that significantly influenced the development of the natural sciences. Few are aware, however, of the central role played by certain crystals from Iceland in many of these develop-ments.

Over a 250-year period, a single quarry at the farm Helgustadir in East Iceland was the only place in the world that supplied crystals of sufficient size and clarity for scientific research and for the construction of high-quality optical instruments. When Vigdis Finnbogadottir became president of Iceland in 1980, no woman had ever before been democratically elected as head of state – anywhere in world. As if that weren't enough, it was also considered strange for an unmarried woman and single mother to serve in such an office.

Alone in the President's Chair by Steinunn Sigurdardottir was first published in the fall of 1988 and garnered much attention, as for the first time people got a glimpse into the daily life of the president. In her book, Steinunn describes with considerable insight seven days in the life of Vigdis: travels both abroad and domestically, state dinners and meetings, internal squabbles, child rearing and her sparse free time. The book is now being reissued, with minor revisions and a new introduction and epilogue by the author, to mark the 90 years since Vigdis' birth and the 40 years since she was elected president of Iceland. 188 pp

The heroic tale of this charismatic young woman, who had a chance to work as a model in New York, is divided according to the four seasons. Heiða tells of her struggles with herself and the powers of nature with deep feeling, keen wit and humor, weaving the narrative with anecdotes of her animals and farm work. Hundreds of Icelanders perished in only a few weeks, mostly young people in the prime of their lives, more women than men. Countless children lost their parents. These were harrowing times, with almost relentless funeral processions and tolling of church bells.

This book tells the story of the people of Iceland, for example a trawler fisherman who returns from sea to find life in Reykjavik all but extinguished, and a beloved singer who dies, leaving her infant daughter behind. We see several memorable individuals – doctors, nurses, midwives, and others who battled heroically against "the great plague", often to little effect.
