After studying at the Iceland University of the Arts, he graduated as a director in 2022 from the prestigious theatre academy DAMU in Prague. His directorial debut, *Nothing is more tragic than a human being*, was nominated for seven Gríma awards. He has previously published the novel *About the philosophy of ABBA* (or, *my life as Olof Palme*). Audur Haralds Why is the Lord so Lazy ?

Hvað er Drottinn að drolla? novel, 2022

Most writers want to write about time travel. But nearly all of them resist the urge for fear that they will be seen as childish or stupid. Not me. I couldn't care less what people think of me.

Should a person be hurled through the web of time and come out at an interesting point, then the fourteenth century wouldn't be a bad place to end up. In 1346 a merchant ship docks at the quay in Messina, Sicily. In the belly of the ship are rats and on the rats are fleas and inside the fleas are Yersinia pestis. No, Yersinia pestis is not some harmless, Russian housewife who chisels ice off the streetcar rails in the winter. It is the bacterium that causes the Black Death. And in only a few years 30-60% of Europeans will die from the plague.

And so it happens that Gudbjorg, an office worker in Reykjavik, is unwittingly pulled into a time warp and finds herself in England during the time of the plague. And here you might wonder what good modern knowledge is, when modern times have been left behind. 270 pp

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

In addition to writing books, Audur Haralds (b.1947) has worked as a journalist and translator. Her first novel *Everyday Hero: Three Surefire Methods to Have Children Out of Wedlock* was released in 1979 and was hailed as an outspoken, tragicomic portrayal of the role of women at the beginning of a watershed period for women's rights.



In Dear Suns we follow three markedly different women through the sweeping countryside and bustling cities of Spain until you can almost feel the sun beating down as you sip your sangria.

Asa Marin Dear Suns Elsku sólir, novel, 2022

When Sunna and Arsol receive a letter from their mother who claims to be at death's door they have opposite reactions: Arsol wants to rush to her side but Sunna is full of misgivings. The mother and daughters share a fraught relationship with a past marked by disappointment and pain. In the end the sisters are joined by Barbara, an old friend of their mother, as they hurry off to Andalucia. What happens upon their arrival takes everyone by surprise, but gradually they come to realize that new friends are much more important than old sins. 272 pp

Asa Marin (b.1977) is an elementary school teacher and has travelled around the world as a tour guide. Her previous novels include *Halfway Around the Globe* and *The Path of the Wind*, both of which are about unexpected adventures in exotic places.

Benny Sif Isleifsdottir Gratiana

Gratíana, historical novel, 2022 Daughters #2

After three years living in a small village, the hopes that Gratiana harbored for the future have come to nothing, but her mother Evlalia remains undaunted. She cunningly spins the wheel of life and marks a new path, not only for herself, but also for Gratiana and little Asdis. It leads to momentous changes – but not necessarily the ones intended. The ember of women's rights still glows in Gratiana's heart, but alongside it, other flames ignite: flames that burn her, that she doesn't fully understand, and that she doesn't know whether she wants to fan or extinguish.

Gratiana is the long-awaited continuation of *Daughters*, which was well received by readers and critics and was nominated for the European Union Prize for Literature. 351 pp

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Benny Sif Isleifsdottir (b.1970) is well-known to readers for her historical novels about working-class Icelandic women who must continually fight for their place in the world. She completed a Master's degree in Folkloristics from the University of Iceland and in 2018 she received an Emerging Writer grant from the Icelandic Literature Center for her first novel. Her novel, *Daughters*, was nominated for the Europe an Union Literature Prize 2021.

More and more often, there's a peculiar sound on a pedestrian bridge in downtown Reykjavik. Is it a design flaw? Or is it the murmur of the ages? Then mysterious phenomena emerge that don't conform in any way to the laws of physics. Scientists are stumped. The stock market takes a dive. Poetry collections take over the best seller lists. Cats disappear. Lights flame up the sky. And love blossoms between a young couple in Reykjavik. When physics and poetry meet, Lightning appears.

Lightning is the third novel by Dagur Hjartarson, who has received various recognitions for his work and praise from readers and critics for his personal and brilliant style. 208 pp

Dagur Hjartarson (b.1986) is amongst Iceland's most interesting writers. His first novel, *The Last Confession of Love*, was shortlisted for The European Union Prize for Literature 2016. It was a death sentence. Most likely they were all thinking the same, as apart from the whine of the wind and the mutter of the waves, there was silence in the darkness on the wet, slippery keel of the boat.

When a fishing boat capsizes out on the open sea late one dark winter evening off the south coast of Iceland, there's little hope for the men on board – there's no lifeboat, no radio, no flares, nothing at all. Of the five fishermen, three make it to the keel and the others disappear into the depths. When the boat slips below the waves, their only option is to swim and hope, even though it's a long way to shore and home in the Westman Islands. Before long there's only one left. Completely alone.

One man faces the overwhelming elements, one man swimming in the open sea in bitter cold and black night, with no hope of rescue. One by one, each spark of hope is extinguished as the others vanish into the darkness, nobody on board a passing boat notices the man in the water, and he swims on, swims, swims in desperation...

Einar Karason recounts in striking style a tale of deadly danger and the will to survive. *Open Sea* is a novel based on true events, as were his previous novels *Storm Birds and Dark Skies*. Both were well received, with a respected award in Sweden for *Storm Birds*, which was also selected by the Sunday Times as the best translated novel of 2020. 126 pp

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Einar Karason (b.1955) is a novelist and one of the most popular authors and scriptwriters of his generation; best known for his *Devils' Isle* trilogy. His novel *Fury* (2009) was nominated for the Nordic Council Literature Prize and awarded the Icelandic Literary Prize. Foreign publishers showed tremendous interest in his novel *Storm Birds* (2018) and the rights have been sold in several countries.

Haukur Mar Helgason Reykjavik Prison

Tugthúsið, historical novel, 2022

At the height of the Enlightenment, in 1757, Iceland's sheriffs collectively signed a plea to their King in Copenhagen. Hoping to cut the expense of sheltering, feeding and shipping drifters and thieves to Denmark's prisons, they sought permission to hang them. This proposal shocked the Palace and was refused by the King, who decreed, instead, that Iceland should have a prison of its own.

In the following years, felons were kept in sheds where they slept on seaweed, while building the new premises, the Reykjavik Prison. Once erected, the building served its intended purpose: men, women and children were imprisoned for roaming, illicit births, thefts, disobeying their superiors and other wrongdoings. Some got out alive. Others were worked to death, tortured, or starved.

Two centuries after the prison was abolished, this former house of horrors now serves a more prestigious role, as the site of Iceland's Government. As staff members repeatedly report their discomfort on the premises, Security Chief Pall Holt investigates, having few more urgent matters on his hands. Might this unease have something to do with the building's original purpose? Might something remain unsaid, after all these years? *Reykjavik Prison* is Mr. Holt's report. 453 pp

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Haukur Mar Helgason (b.1978) studied philosophy in Reykjavik and Berlin. He has authored, translated, edited and published a wide range of works, journalistic and literary. Outside his native Iceland, Helgason's writings have appeared in publications such as The London Review of Books, Radical Philosophy, and Lettre International. *Reykjavik Prison* is his third novel.

We've started spending increasing amounts of time going through the alphabet letter by letter. After going through A and trying out the name "Arndis" it's as though something is stuck in her throat. She groans, "Bl... Bl... Bla..." I'm quick to jump in and call out, "Blaer!" in the moment that I prepare to pull out. But she locks her legs around me and yells, "Don't!"

Conception won the New Voices unpublished manuscript competition held by Forlagid in 2022. These are candid, deeply funny love stories about thirty-somethings in Reykjavik that come together in unexpected ways. The party is still raging while the pressures of adulthood: apartment, child, car all loom tall — could it really be time to pop out a grandchild for mom when we can't even agree on what to watch on TV? And who exactly is responsible for the endless flow of semen downtown every weekend? 150 pp

Heida Vigdis Sigfusdottir (b.1992) received a degree in creative writing from the University of Iceland and is a member of the improv group 'Eldklárar og eftirsóttar'. *Conception* is her first novel. Arnaldur Indridason has long been Iceland's most popular writer and also enjoys great popularity abroad. *Indifference* is his twenty-sixth novel. His novels have been translated into more than forty languages, and have brought their author prizes and accolades around the world. Arnaldur Indridason's last book, *The King and the Clockmaker*, was nominated for the Icelandic Literary Prize 2021.

Adam has just turned up for work at the Salo psychology practice when a child is abducted from its reception area. Later that same day, his former wife, police detective Soffia pressures him to take on a case that he's certain breaks every professional ethics code. To further complicate Adam's life, his elderly parents in England have begun behaving very strangely, and the secret of Jenny, the alter ego who paints her nails when nobody's looking, teeters constantly on the verge of being discovered.

Defenceless is Jonina's twentieth book and the second to feature Adam and Soffia, after the first, *Deceit*, has been extremely well received. Here she continues to weave a tangled mystery with an engaging cast of characters, each of whom brings a complex set of their own issues to the story. 350 pp

This is the second poetry book from Ari Johannesson, who has also written two novels. Ari draws inspiration in part from his profession, intertwining poetic and medical language in compelling snapshots of people on the edge. In 2004, it was nominated Best Foreign Play in Italy. Her second play *Easy now, Electra* was performed at the National Theatre of Iceland in 2000.
